Amendment
of regulation
2

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Wildlife Conservation (Management of Wildlife Captive Facilities) (Amendment) Regulations, 2025 and shall be read as one with the Wildlife Conservation (Management of Wildlife Captive Facilities) Regulations, 2020 hereinafter referred to as the “principal Regulations”.

2. The principal Regulations are amended generally by deleting the words “Director General” wherever it appears and substituting for them the words “Director.”.

3. The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 2, by-

- (a) deleting the definition of the term “Director General”;
- (b) deleting the figures “500” and “2,000” appearing in the definition of the term “wildlife farm” and substituting for them the figures “200” and “1,000” respectively;

- (c) deleting the figure “2,000” appearing in the definition of the term “wildlife ranch” and substituting for it the figure “1,000”;
- (d) adding the words “multi-use wildlife captive facility, public captive facility” immediately after the word “zoo” appearing in the definition of the term “wildlife captive facility”;
- (e) adding in the appropriate alphabetical order the following new definitions:

““Board” means the Board established under the Wildlife Conservation (Tanzania Wildlife Management Authority) Establishment Order;

“Director of Forestry” has the meaning ascribed to it under the Forest Act;

“filial generation” means offspring produced by a set of parents in a controlled environment;

“multi-use wildlife captive facility” means a wildlife captive facility that involves keeping wild animals for non-consumptive or consumptive wildlife utilisation activities or both in an area which is also used for other recreational or residential activities;

“professional guide” means a person who guides, leads, directs, or accompany visitors in a wildlife captive facility;

“right of occupancy” has the meaning ascribed to it under the Land Act;”.

4. The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 4-

(a) in subregulation (1), by deleting the word “any” appearing in paragraph (a);

(b) by adding immediately after subregulation (1) the following:

“(2) Notwithstanding subregulation (1)(a), the Director may identify reserved

lands or conservation areas which are suitable for establishment of wildlife captive facilities.

(3) Pursuant to subregulation (2), only zoos and sanctuaries may be established in forest reserves located in urban areas after prior consultation with the Director of Forestry on the suitability of the area.”; and

(c) by renumbering subregulations (2) and (3) as subregulations (4) and (5) respectively.

5. The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 5 by deleting subregulations (2) and (3) and substituting for them the following:

“(2) The Director shall receive applications for registration of wildlife captive facilities.

(3) The application referred to under subregulation (1) shall be submitted to the Director accompanied with-

- (a) a certified copy of certificate of right of occupancy;
- (b) a business plan or a project proposal of the undertaking;
- (c) proof of payment of the application fees set out in the Second Schedule;
- (d) a certified copy of tax clearance certificate;
- (e) a certified copy of memorandum and articles of association, if the applicant is a body corporate;
- (f) a certified copy of tax payer identification number; and
- (g) a certified copy of certificate of registration or certificate of incorporation if the applicant is a body corporate.”.

6. The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 6 by deleting the words “or sanctuary” wherever

they appear and substituting for them the words “sanctuary or multi-use wildlife captive facility”.

7. The principal Regulations are amended by deleting regulation 9 and substituting for it the following:

“Consideration
of applications

9.-(1) The Director shall, after receipt of applications made under regulation 5(2)-

(a) nominate a team of at least three authorised officers to inspect the premises in respect of which the application has been lodged; and

(b) require the team to submit a written recommendation within twenty-one days from the date of nomination as to whether-

(i) the application may be accepted or rejected; or

(ii) the 2e may be accepted on conditions.

(2) After considering the advice of the team, the Director may-

(a) in consultation with the Minister, grant a certificate of registration subject to certain conditions and on payment of registration fee set out in the Second Schedule; or

(b) reject the application and provide reasons thereof.

(3) The Director shall, within ten working days after making the decision on an application, notify the applicant in writing.”.

- 8.** The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 10, by-
- (a) deleting subregulation (3);
 - (b) deleting the words “ten years” appearing in subregulation (4) and substituting for them the words “six years”;
 - (c) deleting subregulation (6); and
 - (d) renumbering subregulations (4), (5) and (7) as subregulations (3), (4) and (5) respectively.

- 9.** The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 11(1)(b) by deleting the words “or any other relevant law”.

 - (b) adding immediately after paragraph (f) the following:
 - “(g) ensure that there is no direct contact between human being and any carnivore, except carnivore bred from filial four generation in captivity and raised under similar environment;
 - (h) ensure that all activities related to wildlife use are conducted under close guidance of wildlife captive facility’s professional guide; and
 - (i) ensure high standard of safety for all visitors at all times;”.

- 11.** The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 18 by deleting the words “consultation with the Director of Wildlife and”.

19

- 12.** The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 19-
- (a) in subregulation (3), by-

- (i) deleting the word “quota” appearing in paragraph (a) and substituting for it the words “list of animal species”;
- (ii) adding immediately after paragraph (b) the following:
 - “(c) capture parent stock in open areas and Wildlife Management Areas;”;
- (iii) rename paragraphs (c) and (d) as paragraphs (d) and (e) respectively; and
- (b) adding immediately after subregulation (4) the following:
 - “(5) An operator of wildlife captive facility granted a capture permit and fails to capture the specified animal within the specified period shall be given an extension period of thirty days upon payment of extension fee of 15 percent of the value of the animals to be captured during the extension period.
 - (6) Capturing of parent stock in Wildlife Management Areas shall be in line with the Resource Zone Management Plan or General Management Plan.”.

13. The principal Regulations are amended by deleting regulation 22 and substituting for it the following:

“Register
of animal
species

22.-(1) Every operator of a wildlife captive facility established in a controlled environment shall-

- (a) keep and maintain a register of animal population including any off-take, dead or newborn animals;
- (b) submit to the Director a quarterly report of animal population kept in the respective wildlife captive facility; and
- (c) be issued with a certificate of ownership for new born animals upon

payment of 20 percent of the parent stock price set out in the Sixth Schedule.

(2) Death of any animal in the wildlife captive facility shall be reported in writing to the Director and be accompanied by a post mortem report.”.

14. The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 23, by-

(a) adding immediately after subregulation (1) the following:

“(2) Capture of parent stock may be conducted in open wildlife ranch provided that the operator of open wildlife ranch has-

(a) accepted the request for capture of parent stock from his facility;

(b) submitted to the Director a list of animal species to be captured for scrutiny and approval, except that animals to be captured are for parent stock only; and

(c) paid the relevant parent stock price.”; and

(b) renumbering subregulation (2) as subregulation (3).

15. The principal Regulations are amended in regulation 24, by-

(a) adding immediately after the word “ranch” appearing in subregulation (1), the words “and public captive facility”; and

(b) adding immediately after subregulation (2) the following:

“(3) For the purposes of this regulation “public captive facility” means the wildlife captive facility established and managed by the Government.”.

16. The principal Regulations are amended by deleting regulation 25 and substituting for it the following:

“Consumptive
wildlife
utilisation

“**25.**-(1) An operator of open wildlife ranch, who intends to conduct consumptive use of wildlife shall adhere to the following conditions:

- (a) has paid user right fee as prescribed under the Eighth Schedule; and
- (b) has obtained a written permission and animal quota from the Director.

(2) Without prejudice to subregulation (1), an operator of the facility shall pay to the Authority the permit and game fee for animal hunted in accordance with regulations relating to tourist hunting.

(3) An operator of a closed wildlife ranch, breeding facility and wildlife farm, who intends to conduct consumptive use of wildlife shall adhere to the following conditions:

- (a) submit to the Director a list containing the number of animal species to be hunted in respect of tourist or resident hunting;
- (b) obtain a written permission and animal quota from the Director;
- (c) pay to the Authority, 15 percent of game fee for every animal hunted in the wildlife captive facility in accordance with regulations relating to tourist hunting; and
- (d) in case of subsistence hunting for locals and

residents, pay to the Authority 15 percent of the fee for every animal hunted in the wildlife captive facility in accordance with regulations relating to subsistence hunting.”.
